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Source A

[Jean Le Bel, a French chronicler, writing an account of the Battle of Crecy, 1346]

At Carcassonne, everyone but the monks ran away and the army lodged in the comfort of the town. After resting in the town and rejecting a plea with money to prevent the Prince from burning the city, the city was burnt, apart from the religious houses. Then, the army marched through the country, avoided conflict, and then headed back towards the town of Homps.
