Interpretation 1

Europe was run on primogeniture, the rule whereby the eldest son inherited all his father's lands, titles, and power. This created a problem – thousands of younger sons without inheritance or purpose, trained only to fight. These men provided much of the fighting force for the Crusade, which in return gave them the opportunity to conquer lands for themselves.
