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QUESTION 3

Study the interpretations below and then answer the question which follows.

Interpretation 1

Prohibition practically created organized crime in America. It provided small-time street gangs with the greatest opportunity ever – feeding the need of Americans coast to coast to drink beer, wine and hard liquor on the sly. Organized racketeers dominated the illegal ‘bootlegging’ industry, as well as urban bosses and vice kings.

[An extract from an article entitled ‘Prohibition Profits Transformed the Mob’, published on the website of the National Museum of Organized Crime and Law Enforcement]

Interpretation 2

Although organized crime flourished under it, Prohibition was not responsible for its appearance, as organized crime’s persistence after repeal demonstrated. Drinking habits underwent a drastic change during the Prohibition Era, and the reduction in consumption continued long after repeal, as did a substantial hard core of popular support for its return.

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QUESTION 4

Study the sources below and then answer the question which follows.

Source C

In America the life of the majority is on a scale that is reserved for the privileged classes anywhere else. The use of the telephone and radio are widespread. Statistics for 1925 show that the United States owned 81 per cent of all the automobiles in existence. The United States consumes almost three-quarters of the available supply of rubber and gasoline.

Source D

Hire purchase is a growing evil. It is an attempt to keep up with the Joneses; to satisfy every need; it results in the neglect of the more substantial things of life. The education of children, their physical well-being, even the care of their teeth, are being neglected to enable families to purchase on installments many luxuries and things they could very well do without.
